PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Sun Herald Surf Swim

The Sun Herald Surf Swim was held on Sunday, March 13 and with over 800 entered and over 650 swimming, it was a huge event for the Club. Over 120 club members were involved on the day in all areas and again a huge thank you to all those that contributed on the day including several like Mike Crawford and Rob Cheney who helped before they swam the event and then backed up again. Only positive comments were received and below are one of the emails received by Fairfax Media:

My thanks go to both the Sun-Herald and Dee Why Surf Life Saving club and it band of Volunteers and professional Life guards for all the work put in today to make the Sun-Herald Surf Swim a great success

I was the oldest swimmer (nearly 70) by about 20 years in my group of 40 + (purple caps) ID 412

It took me a staggering 2 hours, for this, my very first sea swim -- 1500 metres

Disasters faced me several times which had me questioning my sanity to swim these 1500 metres. To start with I have two artificial knees. Then I needed to stop three times during the swim to be violently sea-sick. Severe cramps hit me in both my legs in the last few hundred metres, and drinking about eight litres of sea-water in my marathon caused me to almost sink!!!

The sea today continuously slapped my face, often coming from several directions at once, shoving water down my nose and throat, only to be swallowed or expelled just as violently. Swimming with my head above water because of my claustrophobia of having my face under water, and with the current working against me at times, that it often seemed that I was standing still – or swimming on the spot.

It was a great relief to finally arrive at the shallow water and stagger ashore and be greeted by the supportive hands of Senior life guards Peter and his mate, and the clapping and cheering of the wonderful people still on shore -- an hour after everyone else had left and gone home.

Finally with my two walking sticks ready, I wearily made the long walk up the beach to the finish line...

My completed marathon was nothing like my swimming 2,000 metres that I do in a calm swimming pool these days, and a lot rougher than the red, muddy, leach infested dams in the bush where I learned to swim as a child, and almost drowned several times, along with a future Premier of Queensland.

Thanks to my constant companion a beautiful young Australian man with a German name (starts with T) who stayed on his Life surf board beside me for the last half of my epic water marathon.

*He had concerns for my welfare, and gave me encouragement and support and was there for me throughout my 'ordeal' and each time I was sick. **I think his mother would be very proud of him today***

Thanks also to the young ladies Life Guards on their surf boards who surrounded me out there in the deep water -- also giving me strength from their caring

Swan Lounge



On Friday, March 25 at around 8pm the finishing touches were put to the renovations of the Swan Lounge and entrance for the public unveiling for the NSW Election. Building Work

On March 24, I was formally advised that our application for the Sport and Recreation Capital Works Grant for \$350,000 had been successful. This was our third attempt to receive this grant and it is with great pleasure that I record my and the Club's appreciation to Club member Jeff Tucker for persevering with our application. This brings to a head over 10 years of negotiation with Council and, on occasion, argument and my thanks go to the Building Committee of Allen Lakeman, Julianne Wilkin, Phil Thomas, Jeff Tucker and Life Member, Marty Quinn.

Building should commence soon after Easter, which will probably see the new amenities block open on the northern side of the club house. Along with a new viewing platform for the Lifeguards, the relocation of the showers from the centre of the promenade to the old Lifeguard station, the building of a Lifeguard tower north of the club house and the commencement of the roundabout at the entrance to the car park and the widening of the western footpath in the Strand, will see the beach front resemble a huge building site for some time. On the basis of the time taken to build the new amenities block, from August 2010 to April 2011, I am backing that the club works will be completed well before the others even take shape.



Betty Barry Room

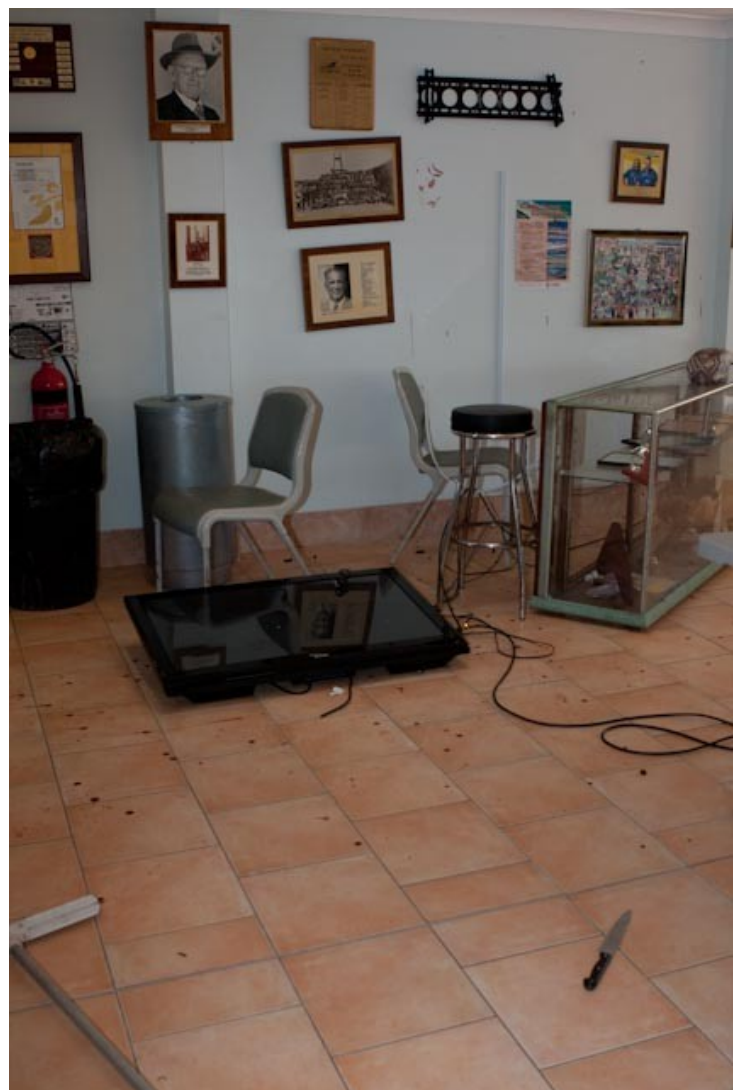
Once again it is disappointing to report that the Betty Barry Room has been broken into and, this time, extensive damage was inflicted. The club Management Committee has spent over \$25,000 of unexpected expenditure because of the first two break-ins which saw the introduction of the key fob system and then the installation of CCTV. The CCTV proved its worth when a clear picture of one of the thieves was identified by the police. One of the thieves lost an extraordinary amount of blood and one of the police forensic investigators made the comment that it was the third worst crime scene she had attended.



The pleasing aspect of all this upheaval was the manner in which several club members reacted to the situation over the whole after the discovery of the damage by Ross Gammidge at around 6am on the Friday morning. Roger Jacobs, Grant Marshall, Dave Lang and Allen Lakeman attended the club and dealt with the police and making the place secure while Roger, our in-house security expert, spent the whole morning downloading the 48 minutes of vision for the police from the CCTV. Liam French your Hon. Secretary took care of the media and it was pleasing to not only see an article in the Manly Daily but it was pleasing to see an editorial denouncing the actions of these antisocial imbeciles.

Then the clean-up had to be done after the police had completed their evidence gathering. Against my wishes, Bec Marshall and Sue Cheney cleaned up all the blood - which was extensive - and were then joined by Marty Quinn, Rob Cheney and Grant Marshall to do the heavy lifting and get rid of the glass. Finally, Peter Firminger reattached the Committee Room door after it had been kicked off its hinges, possibly looking for first aid.

With all the things Club members have been asked to be involved in this season, this was the most unpleasant - but once again the members came through and acted quickly.

Season End

Australian Championships

A team of 37 competitors and a further 15 or so supporters made their way to Kurrawa for the Australian Championships and their quest for success did not go unanswered.

Our first medal was silver in the U/17 Champion Lifesaver won by Emma Jeffcoat. Emma had arrived at the Championships after achieving 13th place in the Australian Triathlon Championships and a Gold medal in the Teams Triathlon Challenge. Emma then followed up this success with a bronze medal in the U/17 2km Beach Run along with several semi-finals and a final in the swim. An outstanding effort for a talented athlete who has just had her first experience on a surf ski with trainers, Gaye and Peter Hatfield. Before Emma



strutted her stuff, the old and bold (Masters) competitors took on the rough and tumble of the Kurrawa surf with a notable result in Peter Hatfield absolutely smashing surf lifesaving legend Grant Kenny in the single ski event. This is the way Peter tells the story. The truth.....while Pete did complete the course as Grant walked away from the surf, they were actually in different heats.

I think that the only comments that really capture the Masters competitors contribution, was that they represented the Club to their best abilities, conducted themselves admirably away from the venue (mainly because they were in bed before 8pm) and enjoyed themselves.

Next, the Club surfing contingent took to the waves and came away with several medals. Coral (Madi) Quinn achieved one Gold and two Bronze medals as well as Female Short Board Surfer of the Championships.



Geoff (Toad) Horner surfed to a Silver (the Gold won by Cheyne Horan) and the Male Long Board Surfer of the Championships. Dee Why also achieved third place in the Teams event. Grant Marshall was very unlucky, but has taken a page from Pete Hatfield's book and, if you allow him, will regale you his life story as the fifth best surfer in Australia.

Jamie Listberger took on some champion runners in the 2km Beach run and represented the club with distinction. Our attention now turns to shipping.

The Dee Why Boaties had an excellent Championship without achieving a medal. The Reserve A's had two wins and a second and then were eliminated in the Quarter Finals. The Open crew made it through to the Semi Finals and despite an outstanding row, were relegated to fifth place and eliminated. Their row from the cans on a small runner was stuff you do not witness very often and it is a credit to them that they came good at the right end of the season and progressed as far as they did.

A story of hard luck, not unlike Grant Marshall's, is left for our Australian Representative U/23 crew who won their Semi-Final by about three wave lengths. They were at unbackable odds to take out the event and when the gun went they led from the start which proved to be their undoing. Being hit twice by large waves - and having two back shoots and roll-overs - does not help their chances. They were officially recorded and did not finish, but that is not reflective of the outstanding season they have had.

Many other Club members excelled in their events achieving personal bests in Ski and Ironman events. My congratulations to all the competitors and my thanks to the supporters and a special thank you to Geoff Horner for towing the gear trailer. For those of you not involved in the administrative side of the Club, enjoy your time away and I look forward to welcoming you back to our 99th season.

A great day was had by all but no-one went through to any finals. Wayne Weisse, Peter Hatfield, Ed Selby, Marty Quinn and Geoff Horner all put in good efforts.

Sunday saw the team events start with Geoff back in action. It looked like being a good day with Geoff and Peter in the 45-49 Double Ski Final and Wayne and Marty in 50-54 Double Ski Final. Sunday also saw the start of Lifesaving events with Emma Jeffcoat taking a Silver medal in the U17 Champion Lifesaver (swim-board-tube-sprint races then resuscitation, CPR and a written exam) - only missing out on Gold by 1-5 points.



Most of the Masters team arrived on Thursday, March 30. Tents went up for the whole team, trailers were unloaded, boards and skis were checked in preparation for the weekend's competition.





Monday was a lay day, with senior competitors getting ready for the week ahead. Surf boats were weighed and checked.

Tuesday and it was on everywhere – boats, skis, boards, tubes, board riding. Rob Cheney made it through a round of ski, Emma made it through to a 2nd round of tube. Our U23 boat crew made it through to semis on Sat, our A Reserve boat crew competed with a 1st-2nd-2nd then out in the Semi – their carnival was over. Even with such good results in the early rounds, Kurrawa can be cruel. Geoff Horner made it through to the Semi in Over 40 Short Board. Madison Quinn won a Bronze in the Open Women's Long Board.

PATROLLING ON THE BEACH From Vice Captains Denise, Peter & Wayne

Well patrolling has ended for the season. We have patrolled over the entire Easter Long Weekend (Friday through to Tuesday). A big thanks to all the patrols who attended over the holiday period – hot cross buns & Easter eggs for all !!

A BBQ for patrols was run on Sunday after last patrol (April 24) and again Tuesday, April 26; after the very last patrol of the season.

Thanks to all patrolling members for your dedicated service over the season; it is truly appreciated.

We look forward to seeing you all at the upcoming Presentation Night on May 28.

IRB DEPARTMENT

Well the season is sadly now over. The IRB Department will be working through the off season undergoing a full maintenance program on all IRBs. Things are changing with the IRBs for next season. SLSA have set new protocols for the gear inspection that takes place at the beginning of every season, the Crew people will see that the **right foot strap** is no longer there and the others are adjustable; this is due to the high injury incident rate of Crew persons' right feet. With the adjustable straps the left foot can be locked into position, catering for those with a smaller foot making it more safe and comfortable for both Driver and Crew.

The other is that the three bladed props are to be replaced by a four bladed prop. The four bladed prop is slower at top end, however it gives more torque at the lower end. This will give you more control on take off, turning and not to mention cavitations. In a few years, SLS will be introducing four stroke injection motors, hence we will need larger IRBs - but that's a few years down the track.

How good is the new IRB? I personally was surprised when I drove it for the first time, the extra chins in the hull really make a big difference in the turning capabilities. It looks good in the water and sitting on the beach, it will last us a long time if we all take pride in it and treat it with respect. One of the ways we can increase it's lifetime is to make sure it's operated at the right pressure: 3.5 to 4 psi. The gauge is stored with the compressor, so please use it.



Next season we will be using the three new motors. Each Sunday or Monday I check the log book to see if any maintenance is needed. These logbooks are the only way I can monitor the hours of running with the motors, so you Drivers and Crew can really help by filling in the logbook each patrol or event that they are used. It only takes two minutes and it will help to have operational equipment at your disposal.

Another 5 members have completed the Crew Course, so well done to Taylah Davies, Nicola Quinn, Jack Bryant, Steph Gardham and Steve Polley. I must also thank Tim Wainwright for assisting on the course and Simon Moriarty for assessing them. This gives us a total of 10 Crew and 2 Drivers so far this season which calculates to 124 hours of training. If we can maintain this for next season, it will reduce the pressure on filling those positions on the roster. We will be conducting another Drivers Course out of season starting in June, so any crew persons out there that want to up skill to Driver, please email me on allan@skinnerproduction.com.au with an expression of interest and I will keep you in the loop. The course should take about 5 to 6 weeks if the ocean conditions allow. This would mean a commitment from you one evening for 2.5 hours of theory as well as a 4 hour practical on the weekend each week. It's great fun to do, with lots of learning to take in, but very worthwhile. You do not need a boat licence, however, we will help with the theory so as a group of you can sit your Boat Licence.

If there is anyone out there that can offer time to doing water safety in the IRB for nippers on a Sunday morning, please contact Ron Tyson on

Patrol 10 as he is putting together a roster for those activities.

Please please do not place the Powercraft Operating Signs in or on the IRB as they are sharp. When the IRB is being towed to the clubhouse they bounce around in the IRB and rupture it. This goes for Boards as well - it doesn't take much to put a hole in them.

Please please instead of refuelling the IRB in the boat, all you have to do is go into the IRB shed and get another bladder. You will find there's always one filled ready to go. This will stop fuel from spilling into the IRB and dissolving the glues that hold it together.
